The question of the original
provenance of this and
other statues of Amenophis III
is not yet
answered to my

satisfaction. "Beloved of Nekheni, in the midst
of Khaemma'at (Soleb)".

In the "SW" quarter, near the surface
of drift sand, is a large abacus from
the capital of a col. of reddish brown sandstone.
It is in very bad condition; will break in fragments
when moved.

This is perhaps the same abacus as that
copied by Lepsius.

- (3) B 1200
Jan. 11.
- Laid a RR across top of mound 1200 in order
to excavate on "S" of mound and dump[?]
on Rooms B 1201 - 1204.
- Used a small gang all day on examining
excavated part. See sheets B 1200 (2) and (3).
The space 1202 was manifestly used
for fires for cooking purposes. Four
hearths are distinctly visible, --one in the
"NW" corner which has burned the walls.
The debris to the lowest depth all over] the
site contains coals, bones of cattle,
ashes and potsherds --other than the
burnt layer over the Aspalta floor.
- The heavy "N" wall now shows four
periods of construction, as we found
a wall underneath while hunting for f.dep.
