Monday

March 22nd : -- 100 Locals.

90th Day of work : -- Strong northerly gale with driving sand all day.

Work on (1) B 551 I<sup>3</sup>, II<sup>3</sup>, III<sup>3</sup> (2) "N" of B 802 "NE".

(1) B 551 I<sup>3</sup> II<sup>3</sup> III<sup>3</sup> : -- Continued clearing opposite "N" half of Pylon I B 500.  
March 22nd From the 2nd flag staff niche northward the pylon face

is buried under fall of blocks and chips, at clearing of which progress is slow. From half way between 1st + 2nd flag staff niches to the pylon doorway, and "E" of the 1st Room a complex of red brick walls built against the pylon.

Removed two inscribed stones built into late intrusive rubble wall in II<sup>2</sup> as per sketch : --

Y = Funerary stela<sup>19</sup> of [Drawing: Hieroglyphs], wife of Nastasen). There are  
five horizontal lines of text at the base, which looks as if it had  
been cut off, (i.e. there were probably more lines originally.)  
Also face down.

Z = Plain granite slab lying on debris, but the "S" end built into  
rubble wall.

(2) "N" of "NE" corner B 802 : -- Clearing (one Egyptian) of ground adjacent to this  
March 22nd doorway noted at this point on March 5th + 6th  
North of the wall of B 802 + a little "W" of the corner  
picked up inner face (plastered white) of an early mud  
brick wall, which continues under the wall of B 802,  
running "NS". The work continues.
