- ⑨ Report to Hampson Gary (American Diplomatic Agent) on political conditions in Egypt: with reference to the renewed Nationalist movement (Dec. 6, 1918).
  - (a) people too ignorant to form an intelligent opinion on public matters and too timid to make their opinion effective.
  - (b) Independence of Egypt means the establishment of a tyrannical native autocracy which does not even understand the meaning of "equal justice" and "efficient government."
  - (c) The incapacity of the Egyptian autocracy for self government is a matter of historical record. The character of its members is unchanged.
  - (d) The Nationalist Party is pro-German and pro-Turk and has been so all through the war. [strikeout] They do not now [strikeout] believe that the Germans are really beaten. If they receive the power they will constitute a nearly irresponsible [?] state of the Turkish type, permeated with German influence and lying on the flank of the British Empire and one of the great -- -- [?] a perpetual danger.
  - (e) The Nationalist party is largely comprised (rank and file) of school-boys 65% of the higher classes in the schools failed at the last examinations.
