(2) Work on chapel and stair of Pyr. VI. The roof was preserved in Cailliaud's time see Text Vol. I p. 205.<sup>21</sup> The figures shown Pl. LV 3,4<sup>22</sup> are still there preserved of less than ½ the height. Many painted frags. in the debris.<sup>23</sup>

Here again, frags. of cols. and two walls in front of chapel indicate a vestibule. In front of the N end of chapel a <u>battered triad</u><sup>24</sup> (see also Cailliaud I p. 206)<sup>25</sup> lies on its back. Probably came from hole in wall.

Stair—hard red debris. In debris 50 cm above 9<sup>th</sup> step, a bronze jub (see above under (1)).

(3) Work on Pyr. VII. This pyr. was noted by Cailliaud but was a more ruined heap in his day. The debris on the lower part of the mound is covered pebbles and appears old. The stair has hard red debris and is of fair size.

(4) Work on stair of Pyr. VIII. Appears very large. Hard red debris except at end, which is filled with laminated drift.
