(3) B 906

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Further clearing to "W" of B 906 makes clear further details of the plane of this portion[?] of the building.

Dotted lines show position of later red sandstone and mud wall of poor construction. Note walls "a" + "b" are not in line, indicating an angle concealed under the later wall.

It is remarkable that no connection is discernible between 907 or 906 and 908-909 (one room) nor between 905-907 and 906 after the blocking of the doorway (c). # Another point of obscurity is the room 910 which has no stone pavement, and is filled with mud debris (packing). At the "W" end of 910 on this packing are several courses of crude brick. Thus this room has the appearance of a stairway corridor.

Taking off at the top of the stone

steps leading up from B 801 along the "E" side of the red sandstone pylon (d). But the doorway e from 909 → "W" has been blocked apparently at the time of the construction of that stairway (d).

Thus if 910 was a stairway at the time when 908-909 was accessible through doorway e, it could have had no connection with stairway d.

And thus it is plain that the plan of the building 904 - 910 is still incomplete. Further a question now arises as to the pylon of the crude brick temple B 800 - First. If that pylon ever existed and was

of normal size, it must have closed doorway e,

Further clearing is necessary.
