to be unrecognizable.

The other is so crumpled as

\*A bronze statuette<sup>10</sup>, with plenti-  
full traces of gilding. A male

\*solid figure, left leg advanced. Arms across  
the chest as if carrying something.

Probably with uraeus on forehead, though this  
is not clear owing to corrosion. The position  
of the arms strikes me as unusual. Missing below  
the knees as drawn. A female head, probably hollow  
by the weight, Greek or Roman Type, with curls[?],  
bearing a small crescent on top of head. Base of neck  
to tip of crescent = 6.9 cm. A cylindrical bronze rod  
flaring at top - appears to be a slender column design,  
possible mirror handle -- L. 23.5, D of shaft 2.1.

Also from here (IX 6) a tiny gold amulet, rams head and sun disc L. 1 cm.

47th Day of work: -- (1) Work today consisted of clearing lower levels throughout "N" side  
of room B 501, between the brick intrusive walls. Several periods  
of these walls are represented, at least 2, and probably more, and many  
of the compartments are "blind", without doors, showing that the present  
remains must have been, in some instances, foundations of structures  
at a higher level. Below these compartments, occasional bits of wall  
running at odd angles represent earlier structures. This work of  
clearing was carried out in following areas: -- VIII 6, VII 6, VI 6,  
VI 5, V 5, IV 6, IV 5, III 6, II 6, II 5, I 7, I 6, and I 5.

The red sandstone stela, already noted as lying face down in  
III 6, was further cleared, and it was observed that the 2nd piece, lying  
beneath lower end of the upper frag. is not of the same stone, being  
both wider and thicker.

In area III 6, III 7, i.e. on line between cols 2 + 3 of the "N" row,  
a black granite frag with two inscribed faces at right angles, and flat  
base, which appears to be a bottom corner frag. of a small obelisk.

(2). Investigation "N" of dump and E of B 100 reveals the  
"SW" corner (stone) of a mud brick structure on level  
of B 100. The "S" and "W" walls are having followed to  
discover extent of this building. Also slightly "S"  
and "E" of this building, came on 3 or more graves  
of type B 501 EX 10, as yet only partially cleared.
